Spreading the Word

December, Bristow, Va.: Compatriots Curtis Robb and Thad Hartman live in a community of 479 homes. They wondered why they were the only identified compatriots. As they asked around at different events, it was obvious many had not heard of the Sons of the American Revolution. It was also surprising to see how few flags were up on Veterans Day.

Curtis and Thad decided to use the Flag Certificate of Commendation as a mechanism to raise awareness of the SAR and provide education about how to correctly fly the flag.

After dividing the community in half and surveying approximately 240 houses on a night, Thad and Curtis found 12 good examples of well-lit flags standing proudly on the west side of the community.

Formal invitations for a gathering in the community center were mailed and followed up by emails and phone calls. People in the community started asking about the SAR event on the calendar. A small group gathered for coffee and donuts while Thad, dressed in his period Ranger uniform, and Curtis explained different aspects of the SAR. Some certificates were given out at the gathering for those in attendance. The remaining certificates were hand delivered. As you might expect, 11 of the 12 recognized with certificates were military veterans.

There is no doubt this event raised the awareness of the SAR in the community. Thad and Curtis are considering doing the second half of the community in 2019.

The day-to-day maintenance of the flag is under the direct supervision of the NVCC Manassas Police force. The police force, represented by Officer John Staniowski, sees to it that the flag is flown in accordance with proper flag etiquette and is adjusted daily depending on proclamations of both the Federal Government and the Commonwealth of Virginia. To ensure that the flag is properly displayed, the facilities staff under the direction of Mr. Dan Bieger checks the physical condition of the lighting system, the halyard, and the flag to ensure that all are in appropriate condition for operation and display.

1 Dec.: The Colonel William Grayson Chapter participated in the Wreath Placement Ceremony at Quantico Veterans Cemetery, Quantico, Va. In total, 14,500 wreaths were placed. 8 Dec.: Compatriot Mike Dewalt represented the Colonel William Grayson Chapter at the Commemoration of the Battle of Great Bridge, near the City of Chesapeake, Va. The Great Bridge, the site of the Battle of Great Bridge on December 9, 1775, spans the Albemarle & Chesapeake Canal that connects the Southern Branch of the Elizabeth River and the North Landing River.

The event featured the re-enactment of the Battle, Revolutionary War encampments, demonstrations, character portrayals, camp life, historical displays and lectures, skilled artisans demonstrating early American trades, and children's crafts and activities.

The battle, though very short (about five minutes) and consisting of a combined total of about 300 Patriots and British soldiers, had a major impact on the War. It caused the British basically to abandon Virginia. With Virginia being free of any organized British presence for five years, the colony was able to provide large amounts of men and supplies to the Continental Army with virtually no enemy interference.
