## Washington's Prayer for the Nation

The following prayer was adapted from Washington's "Letter to the States", which he wrote on June 8, 1783 as the commander in chief, at his headquarters in Newburgh, New York. This circular was directed to the governors and states of the new nation. His reference to them has been replaced by the words "the United States." Otherwise, the words and the spellings are those of General George Washington of the Continental Army. This prayer is read aloud each day at Mount Vernon's public wreath laying ceremony at Washington's tomb.

"I now make it my earnest prayer, that God would have the United States in his holy protection, that he would incline the hearts of the Citizens to cultivate a spirit of subordination and obedience to Government, to entertain a brotherly affection and love for one another, for their fellow citizens of the United States at large, and particularly for their brethren who have served in the Field, and finally, that he would most graciously be pleased to dispose us all, to do Justice, to love mercy, and to demean ourselves with that Charity, humility and pacific temper of mind, which were the Characteristics of the Devine Author of our blessed Religion, and without an humble imitation of whose example in these things, we can never hope to be a happy Nation."

## **President's Report**

While COVID-19 resulted in the cancellation of most SAR live events over the last three months, the Virginia Society of SAR made up for it with a combination of virtual, Online remote events and a few events where distancing guidelines permitted attendance.

July started off great. July 4<sup>th</sup> brought a chance to get outside with a live event in Culpeper celebrating the Declaration of Independence. The Declaration was read and discussed in detail. Our chapter was well represented.

However, when the 2020 National Society's General Congress, scheduled for Richmond from July 8 to 16, was cancelled, there was great disappointment in Virginia. Our Virginia Society, scheduled to be the host society, had spent much time and money over the last four years getting ready.

Virginia bounced back with a hybrid meeting on July 18 at the Pohick Church in Lorton to celebrate the 246<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the signing of the Fairfax Resolves. Again, our chapter was well represented.

August 8 saw a virtual district meeting of the SAR Atlantic Middle States Association, with Virginia being well represented.

On August 22, Colonel James Wood II Chapter started getting back outdoors with two grave markings near Front Royal in which our chapter participated.

September was a great month for live, in-person events. On September 5, we had our chapter's first on-site grave marking this year. We marked the graves of William and Francis Montgomery at a cemetery in Manassas. Five neighboring SAR chapters joined us for that event.

On September 12 ceremonies were held at Mount Hebron Cemetery in Winchester to remember General Daniel Morgan and to celebrate the United States Constitution. Again, we were well represented.

On September 18 and 19 VASSAR held its 2020 Semi-Annual Meeting in South Boston, Virginia. It was a great meeting, with the Colonel William Grayson Chapter and individual chapter members receiving a number of awards. We will be presenting many of these at our meeting on October 10.

While we are emerging from lock-down and getting back out into the fresh air, this has also been a time of remembrance for two of our compatriots who recently passed away. Compatriot Alex Gamble passed away on August 29, and Compatriot Allen Robb passed away on September 12. Alex was buried in Dayton, Ohio, near his parents. Allen, a retired Army Colonel, will be interred at Arlington National Cemetery at a date to be announced.

# July 18, 2020: Colonel William Grayson Chapter Participates in the 246<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the Adoption of the Fairfax Resolves

The Fairfax Resolves Chapter of VASSAR sponsored a virtual ceremony to commemorate the 246<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the adoption of the Fairfax Resolves, a set of resolutions adopted by a committee in Fairfax County on July 18, 1774. Written primarily by George Mason, the resolutions rejected the British Parliament's claim of supreme authority over the American colonies. Although more than thirty Virginia counties passed similar resolutions in 1774, the Fairfax Resolves were the most detailed, most influential and most radical.

The meeting included a small contingent of compatriots gathered at Pohick Church in Lorton. Those present at the scene participated via a tablet camera mounted on a tripod, a camera facing the exterior of the church and the podium from which the Master of Ceremonies, Carl Loveland, President of the Fairfax Resolves Chapter, VASSAR, directed the program. Bill Schwetke, VASSAR President, also made his remarks from the podium. The contingent at the church included a four-man Color Guard, which allowed presentation of the national and state colors at the scene. Chapter colors were presented virtually by individuals, as were the wreath presentations

The Colonel William Grayson Chapter was represented in this virtual ceremony by eleven of our compatriots, including some as part of the program. Five, Mike Weyler, Leamon Duncan, Jason Newman, Andrew Mills and Jack Mills, were in the Color Guard, and Leamon presented our chapter wreath. The most significant contribution from one of our members was that from Don McAndrews. He was not only the guest speaker for the event, but also, as George Mason, read a portion of the resolutions during the readings by various compatriots speaking for individual signatories of the resolutions.

### August 22, 2020: CWG Participates in the Johannes Kuller Grave Marking

At 9:00 am on Saturday, August 22, representatives from six SAR chapters, a DAR chapter, a C.A.R society, and the VASSAR President, Bill Schwetke, assembled at the Dry Run Cemetery in Fort Valley, Virginia to honor a Patriot of the American Revolution with the placement of an SAR Grave Marker.

Colonel James Wood II was the host chapter for the event, immediate past-president Dale Corey being the Master of Ceremonies. Altogether a 14-man Color Guard presented the colors, 10 men participated in the three-round Musket Salute, and 10 wreaths were presented at the grave.

Johannes Kuller's parents emigrated from Germany in 1743, settling in Frederick, Maryland. There Johannes was born in 1747. There he also met and married Anna Maria Muller. Johannes and his family eventually moved to Shenandoah County, Virginia where he died in 1796. Johannes and Maria were parents to 10

children, with many descendants and relatives still in the area. The family was represented at the ceremony by Robert Cullers, a direct descendant of Johannes. Robert presented a comprehensive account of the lives of the Kuller descendants.

During the Revolutionary War, Johannes held the office of an "associator" in Maryland. Before the war, to deal with grievances against by Great Britain, Maryland had formed a provisional government known as the Maryland Convention. The Convention circulated a document, "The Association of Free Men of Maryland," which resolved that the colony be put in a state of defense. The executive branch of this Convention was the Council of Safety. Reporting to this body and keeping watch at county level for those disloyal to the provisional government was the Committee of Observation. Johannes Kuller was a member of that committee in 1775 and thereby was referred to as an "associator."

The Colonel William Grayson Chapter was represented by Chapter President Mike Weyler and former Chapter Vice President, Barry Schwoerer. Mike and Barry participated in the Color Guard, which was led by the VASSAR Color Guard Commander, Ken Bonner. Mike Weyler carried the Colonel William Grayson Chapter Flag and presented the chapter wreath. Barry Schwoerer carried a musket in the Color Guard and participated in the Musket Salute.

### August 22, 2020: CWG Participates in the Thomas Buck Grave Marking

At 11:00 am on Saturday, August 22, representatives from six SAR chapters, a DAR chapter, a C.A.R society, and the VASSAR President, Bill Schwetke, assembled at the Buck Family Cemetery in Waterlick, Virginia to honor a Patriot of the American Revolution with the placement of an SAR Grave Marker.

Colonel James Wood II was the host chapter for the event, immediate past-president Dale Corey being the Master of Ceremonies. Altogether a 14-man Color Guard presented the colors, 10 men participated in the three-round Musket Salute, and 10 wreaths were presented at the grave.

Thomas Buck was born in 1756 in Frederick County, Virginia. In 1774, Thomas married Ann Richardson, daughter of Colonel William and Isabella Richardson. On January 11, 1776, Thomas was commissioned a Lieutenant of a company of militia while a resident of Dunmore County (now Shenandoah). In 1777, he was Adjutant under Colonel Joseph Pugh, Commandant of the Dunmore Militia. On September 5, 1777, at Woodstock, he was chosen Captain of a company of volunteers dubbed "Buck's Minute Men" of the 8<sup>th</sup> Virginia Regiment. The unit was sent to Fort Pitt where he served for about four months. In 1778, by then a resident of Frederick County, he raised a company of volunteers and served an additional two months. When the British were on the march from Carolina to Virginia, he was called upon to raise a company of 70 horsemen to move prisoners from Albermarle Barracks to Winchester. While enroute, they were requested to proceed to Fredericksburg and report to General Peter Muhlenburg. These appointments and elections show a high regard for young Thomas Buck, then only in his early twenties. In May of 1793, he was appointed Captain of Virginia Militia by Governor Henry "Lighthorse Harry" Lee and served during the Whiskey Rebellion. After the war, Thomas returned to Frederick County, living in Front Royal where he and Ann raised thirteen children. He died on June 4, 1842 and is buried in the Buck Family Cemetery in Waterlick, Virginia.

With sadness we report the passing of Compatriot Alex Lucien "Buck" Gamble, age 66, of Clear Brook, Virginia and formerly of Dayton, Ohio, who passed away Saturday, August 29, 2020 at the Winchester Medical Center, Winchester, Virginia. Alex had been a member of the Colonel William Grayson Chapter since September of 2016.

Alex was born June 29, 1954 in Dayton, Ohio to the late Lloyd and Mary Frances Gamble. He also had two half-brothers, Lloyd Gamble, Jr. and Donald Gamble.

Alex was a 1972 graduate of Northridge High School and a graduate of the University of Dayton. Upon graduating from college, Alex gained employment with the IRS in Dayton and later transferred to Washington D.C. where he retired in 2009 after 30 years of service.

Alex is survived by his aunt, Mae Smith of Dayton; and numerous cousins, many of whom considered him a brother and an uncle to numerous nieces and nephews.

Alex was buried on September 13, 2020 at Newcomer North Chapel in Dayton, Ohio.

### September 5, 2020: CWG Chapter Hosts Two Montgomery Grave Markings

At 1:00 pm on Saturday, September 5, 2020, representatives from six SAR chapters, a DAR chapter, a C.A.R society, and the VASSAR President, Bill Schwetke, assembled at the Montgomery-Lewis Cemetery in Manassas, Virginia, a cemetery located behind the Manassas Presbyterian Church on Ashton Avenue, to honor two Patriots of the American Revolution, father and son, William and Frances Montgomery, with the placement of an SAR Grave Markers.

Colonel William Grayson was the host chapter for the event, with Curtis Robb as the Master of Ceremonies. Altogether a 14-man Color Guard under the command of Leamon Duncan, 10 of whom formed the Firelock Squad, presented the colors, with 12 wreaths presented at the graves.

William Montgomery was born in 1732 in Ireland, immigrated in 1758 and died in 1803 in Prince William County. His wife Katherina Mars is also buried here. Records show that William and Katherina got married on

the ship on the way to America. She was just 16 years old. They had two Children: a daughter Ann and a son Francis.

They settled in Manassas in their home they called Rosemont. That home saw much use over time, but was eventually demolished in 1976 to make room for the current church building. The cemetery, now property of the church, is situated at the rear of the church.

William Montgomery's patriotic service was giving Material aid to the cause.

Francis Montgomery was born on January 17, 1761 in Prince William County, and died in 1825. Although only 14 years old at the start of the Revolution, by 1781, at 20, he was an Ensign in the Virginia Militia. His unit saw action around Virginia during 1781, including action in support of Lafayette at Richmond.

Wreaths presented to honor the memory of Daniel Morgan included wreaths from VASSAR by 1st VP Jeff Thomas, the SAR Chapters represented by Will Reynolds (Col James Wood II), Mike Weyler (Col William Grayson), Mike Dennis (Culpeper Minutemen), Dave Cook (Fairfax Resolves), Ken Morris (George Mason) and Allan Phillips (General Adam Stepehns). ### September 12, 2020: The Passing of our Compatriot Allen Dodge Robb

With sadness we report the passing of Compatriot Allen Dodge Robb, Colonel, U.S. Army, Retired, a compatriot who joined the Colonel William Grayson Chapter on October 13, 2018, not quite two years ago.

Allen is the brother of Compatriot Curtis Robb, the Chairman of our Grave Marking Committee and our Graves Registration Committee. Allen's other brother, Steve Robb, was also inducted on October 13, 2018, but has moved to Kansas.

Allen passed-away Saturday, September 12, 2020 surrounded by family at the Alder Hospice Care Center in Aldie, VA. He had just celebrated his 82nd birthday. He succumbed to a long battle with cancer. He joins wife Jeanette, who preceded him in death in 2017. They are no doubt waltzing into the sunsets.

From the farm in Kansas to West Point Military Academy, he spent his life in service to his country. He graduated with honors at West Point and began a distinguished Field Artillery career. On the day of his West Point graduation, he went from military formation directly to the West Point Chapel to marry the woman of his dreams.

As a young soldier he completed Ranger training and then served two tours in Vietnam. He received the Distinguished Service Medal for his service in Vietnam, the Legion of Merit, Bronze Star and Army Commendation medals for his extraordinary service. His academic achievements include completion of Command and General Staff College, and Advanced Management Program. He graduated from the Army War College and had the honor of teaching there for several years. He earned master's degree in Nuclear Physics from University of Virginia and spent majority of his career with the Department of Defense at the Pentagon as a nuclear weapons strategist and military target analyst.

He retired with honors after 30 years of service. In his retirement, he solved the scientific equations and physics of the wind-- spending his time flying kites. He received accolades from kite masters all over the country for his colorful displays. He was preceded in death by his wife Jeanette, his parents Ronald and Martha Lou Robb, and sister Yvonne Eckert. He is survived by brothers, Steve Robb and Curtis Robb; daughters Julie Menhart and Kristina Crawford, and son Timothy Allan Robb, in addition to six grandchildren.

The Vigil was under the command of National Color Guard Commander C. Louis Raborg Jr.

Three CWG members attended the event, two of whom, Compatriots Andrew Mills and Jack Mills participated as members of the Color Guard.





### Historical Notes: Washington's Tomb

Perhaps the most venerated tomb in America is that of George Washington. Washington died on December 14, 1799. Congress resolved to build a marble monument in the new Capitol. Martha Washington granted her consent. A crypt was provided under the dome of the Capitol, but the project was never completed.

At ten at night on December 14, 1799, George Washington, fearing premature burial, requested of his doctors to be "decently buried" and to "not let my body be put into the Vault in less than three days after I am dead." In his last will he expressed the desire to be buried at Mount Vernon.

George Washington was entombed in the existing family vault, now known as the old Vault on December 18, 1799. Visitors wrote that the tomb was, "A low, obscure, ice house looking brick vault," which "testifies how well a Nation's gratitude repays the soldier's toils, the statesman's labors, the patriot's virtue, and the father's cares."



### The Old Tomb

In his last will, George Washington directed the building of a new family burial vault in the following words: "The family Vault at Mount Vernon requiring repairs, and being improperly situated besides, I desire that a new one of Brick, and upon a larger Scale, may be built at the foot of what is commonly called the Vineyard Inclosure."

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In 1831, Washington's body was transferred to the new tomb. A French visitor wrote that Mount Vernon had become, "…like Jerusalem and Mecca, the resort of the travelers of all nations who come within its vicinity." Visitors were filled with "veneration and respect," leading them "to make a pilgrimage to the shrine of patriotism and public worth…" Pilgrims from across the country converged on Mount Vernon during the early nineteenth century. Veterans of the American Revolution connected deeply to Washington through the pilgrimage. Many pilgrims, overwhelmed with emotion, wept. An early diarist recounted the following, "One [man] placed himself on the green turf and mused, with his head resting on his arms. Another stood alone among the thicket with folded arms and downcast eyes. A third reclined against a tree and wept…there was nothing artificial in this, nothing premeditated."



The New Tomb

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
