President's Comments: Ross H. Schwalm

Westminster Hessians in Dumfries Presentation at Lake Ridge, Virginia on July 21, 2022 – I presented a lecture on this Revolutionary War topic to 35 residents. Many long time Prince William County residents indicated they had no idea about the Hessian prisoners of war during the American Revolution.

Amphibious Assault on Long Island August 1776 presentation at the Col James Wood II Chapter on July 23, 2022, at Middletown, Virginia – Attended the breakfast meeting of the chapter and gave the subject presentation. Several questions remained unanswered which I followed up on via additional research and email to the chapter. I was awarded a certificate of appreciation.

Visitation for Compatriot John Ward at Fairfax, Virginia on July 27, 2022 – I represented the chapter at this event. Compatriot Ward was a long-time officer in the American Legion and several posts combined to provide honors and conduct the funeral service. I did talk to John's widow and offered to conduct a Compatriot Grave Marking when she is ready in the future.

Dispelling the Myth that Hessians were Mercenaries presentation at Lovettsville Historical Association in Lovettsville, Virginia on Sep 11, 2022 – I traveled per the invitation of Compatriot Ed Spannaus to deliver this talk. Several Hessians deserted from Frederick, Maryland and settled in Loudon County concentrated around Lovettsville which was founded by German immigrants prior to the American Revolution. The one-hour talk lasted two hours as the 30 in person and virtual attendees had many questions. Ed is current chapter president of a Maryland SAR chapter and is working on having me speak to them. Ed is a dual member of the Fairfax Resolves.

Prince William County (PWC) American Revolution Memorial: September 2-17, 2022

The PWC Office of Historic Preservation allowed me to provide input to a budget request to convert Williams Ordinary to a Museum and improve the county land that is currently an undeveloped community park into a Revolutionary War Memorial Park where the memorial will be the centerpiece. On Sep 2, I briefed Potomac Supervisor Bailey and her staff on the project. Staff is in support. Rob Orrison had a separate meeting with Supervisor Bailey and she will support the overall plan of park and monument. On Sep 7, I briefed the VASSAR Board of Managers on the progress of the memorial monument progress to date and President Meyer is still in support to have this as the first fundraising project on Member Clicks. The Historic Commission approved a resolution of support on Sep 13. During Chapter President's Time at the VASSAR Semi-Annual Meeting on Sep 17, I used my two minutes to discuss the PWC Memorial Project.

VASSAR Semi-Annual Meeting at Williamsburg, Virginia on Sep 16 and 17, 2022 – Compatriot Hartman and I participated in the workshops, awards dinner, tour of Yorktown Battlefield and SAR/DAR/CAR attendees photo at the Victory Monument. The chapter was awarded two national certificates/streamers for Education Outreach and Activities as well as one for 100% state participation in Flag Recognition and Flag Retirement. We also participated in VASSAR Flag Retirement which included 20 of the 30 state chapters. We voted to approve a State due increase from \$25 to \$30 per year starting in 2023. We also voted to approve application postage increase from \$9 to \$12 to go into effect Jan 1, 2023. These increases are to cover the cost of Member Clicks enterprise membership management application and the anticipated rise in postage fees coming in the next few years.

July 22, 2022: Funeral Service for Compatriot Curtis Robb at Manassas, Virginia

With sadness we report the passing of Compatriot Curtis Robb. At the request of the family, the SAR Funeral Ceremony was provided for our chapter compatriot. Support was provided from members of the state color guard under the command of Chapter Color Guard Commander Andrew Mills. Compatriots Hartman, Button, Callaway, Weyler, and Jack Mills also supported the ceremony. Compatriot Hartman offered comments on his friend Curtis and used the theme of "grateful" to have known and worked with Curtis. Per our Chapter Constitution, several other members of the chapter attended the funeral. All DAR, CAR and SAR members attending were called forward to pay final respects.

Curtis Watson Robb was born May 24, 1944 in Lawrence, Kansas, the 4th child of Martha L. and Ronald R. Robb. He entered rest on July 17, 2022 in Gainesville, Virginia. Curtis grew up on the family dairy farm and graduated with honors from Emporia (KS) State University. He joined the Air Force and reached the grade of Captain, participating in support activities for the NASA lunar landing missions.

He became quite active in the Sons of the American Revolution and earned awards for his activities in patriot grave-marking. Compatriot Curtis Robb received the SAR Distinguished Service Medal In January 2021

July 23, 2022: Commemoration of the Signing of the Fairfax Resolves, Lorton, Virginia.

Citizens of Fairfax County met in Alexandria's courthouse on July 18, 1774, where they approved George Mason's Fairfax Resolves identifying American rights and resolving to defend them. George Washington was the delegate chosen to carry the Fairfax Resolves to the First Virginia Convention in Williamsburg, August 1, 1774. A most vital portion of the Fairfax Resolves stated: Resolved that the most important part of the British Constitution is the fundamental Principle of the People's being governed by no Laws, to which they have not given their Consent. For if this Part of the Constitution was taken away, the Government must degenerate into an absolute and despotic Monarchy and the freedom of the people be annihilated. The Virginia Convention sent their Resolves with delegates Peyton Randolph, Patrick Henry and George Washington to the First Continental Congress, which began meeting in Carpenters' Hall, Philadelphia, on September 6, 1774. The Fairfax Resolves were revised and approved as the Continental Association on October 20th, 1774.


August 20, 2022: Color Guard Workshop

Historical Notes:

George Washington: Freemason

Freemasonry became very popular in colonial America. The earliest of American lodges were the First Lodge of Boston, established in 1733, and one in Philadelphia, established about the same time. Benjamin Franklin served as the head of the fraternity in Pennsylvania, as did Paul Revere and Joseph Warren in Massachusetts. Other well-known Masons involved with the founding of America included John Hancock, John Sullivan, Lafayette, Baron Fredrick von Steuben, Nathaniel Greene, and John Paul Jones.

George Washington joined the Masonic Lodge in Fredericksburg, Virginia at the age of 20 in 1752. His Masonic membership, like the others public titles and duties he performed, was expected from a young man of his social status in colonial Virginia. Not much is known of Washington's Masonic life during the quarter century following his induction into the fraternity. Tradition puts him in various military lodges during the time, but because of their traveling nature, there remains no record of his attendance.

Washington returned to Mount Vernon in 1783 after the Revolutionary War. He was invited to joint Lodge No. 39 and later became the first Worshipful Master of the newly established Grand Lodge of Virginia (Lodge No. 22). He served some twenty months in this post. During his tenure as Worshipful Master of the Grand Lodge of Virginia, Washington was inaugurated President of the United States, becoming the first and only Mason to be President of the United States and Master of his lodge at the same time.

President Washington took his oath of office on a Bible from St. John's Lodge in New York, at his first inauguration in 1791. During his two Presidential terms, he visited Masons in North and South Carolina and presided over the cornerstone ceremony for the U.S. Capitol in 1793, laying the cornerstone of the United States Capitol in Masonic garb, as chronicled by the *Alexandria Gazette* of September 25, 1793. In retirement, Washington sat for a portrait in his Masonic regalia, and in death, was buried with Masonic honors.
